- **3.** *Board & Administrator for Board Members* Monthly Publication August 2019 Reflection I have provided a brief reflection on a few of the articles from the August publication. I hope you have had an opportunity to read and reflect.
  - <u>Developing a superintendent's entry plan: Part 1</u> The author shares his experience starting as a superintendent in a new school district. Interesting reflection for all of us.

- <u>Don't obsess over how the money is spen</u>t; monitor The article reminds board members of the board's primary role and function when it comes to district finances beginning by monitoring the district's finances by watching these four areas:
  - $\checkmark$  Set financial policy
  - ✓ Approve a budget
  - $\checkmark$  Delegate to the superintendent the authority to carry out financial policy
  - ✓ Monitor financial outcomes

The article reminds board members to avoid wandering around "in the weeds" of the district's finances. Once the board approves a budget, allow the superintendent to work with staff and spend the money the board has budgeted and then hold the superintendent accountable for financial results. Questions the board should ask of the superintendent include:

- $\checkmark$  Are we on target with planned expenses and revenues?
- ✓ Do budget expenses and revenue projections work out?
- ✓ Will we have income to pay future expenses?

As a board, you should also ask for:

- $\checkmark$  A financial statement
- ✓ Bottom-line figures referencing revenue and expenditures
- ✓ Historical figures for comparison
- <u>Neighbor request to fix school equipment: Handle or forward to superintendent</u>? The article offers a scenario where a resident neighbor calls a board member direction to inquire about broken playground equipment. What does the board member do? The article advises the board member to first acknowledge the resident's concern but then follow policy by directing the resident to the principal rather than the board member contacting the principal. The board member should then inform the superintendent of the concern so he or she is aware.
- 4. Design and Build Update The Core Planning Group plans to meet on Tuesday, September 17, to take a first look at cost estimates for the preliminary design work performed up to this point. The group consists of representatives from ISG and Knutson along with District officials including Doug Anderson, Dave Bunn, Karla Christopherson, Rick Schultz and Dale Carlson. The purpose of the group is to provide direction to ISG and Knutson for moving forward with design decisions.
