As we continue to focus on all learners during the COVID-19 event, the information below, provided by the Minnesota Department of Education, highlights how as a school community, we can support our gifted and talented students, as well as all students.

Research indicates that many gifted children experience heightened sensitivity to environmental stimuli because of their rapid information processing (Mendaglio, 2007). Many of these students are dismayed by the news and the apparent lack of a solution to the pandemic. Some are imagining the worst possible outcome of the current or an imagined circumstance. Others may be feeling isolated or depressed. The National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) reminds us that during these uncertain times, children look to adults for guidance on how to react. As our anxiety rises so does the anxiety of our children. NASP recommends, "Parents reassure children that health and school officials are working hard to ensure that people throughout the country stay healthy. However, children also need factual, age appropriate information about the potential seriousness of disease risk and concrete instruction about how to avoid infections and spread of disease. Teaching children positive preventive measures, talking with them about their fears, and giving them a sense of some control over their risk of infection can help reduce anxiety."
