Alternative Learning Program

A small group of staff members met on January 11 after school to discuss the possibility of an alternative learning program. The committee discussed looking at a Gedo #2 program of some variation from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. The GED Option #2 (GEDO #2) Program would allow NRHEG district to use the GED test battery to measure proficiency in lieu of high school credit for students enrolled in an alternative education program. A student who passes the GED tests and completes the other requirements for graduation (State Standards) is entitled to the traditional high school diploma. Minnesota would need to receive approval to offer this opportunity to local school districts as part of its waiver application to GED Testing Service. Next steps in our process is to finalize a presentation to the Minnesota Department of Education and participate in a Google Hangout meeting with them because this program would be different than any of the current alternative education programs in the state of Minnesota and would need approval to move to the next steps.

WEB is a Middle School Transition program

What is WEB?

WEB, which stands for “Where Everybody Belongs” is a middle school orientation and transition program that welcomes 6th/7th graders and makes them feel comfortable throughout the first year of their middle school experience. Built on the belief that students can help students succeed, the program trains mentors from your 8th grade class to be WEB Leaders. As positive role models, WEB Leaders are mentors and student leaders who guide the 6th/7th graders to discover what it takes to be successful during the transition to middle school and help facilitate 6th/7th grade success.

More and more studies show that if students have a positive experience their first year in middle school, their chances for success increase dramatically. WEB provides the structure for 6th/7th graders to receive support and guidance from 8th graders who have been through the challenges that middle school poses and understand that the transition to a larger school can sometimes be overwhelming.

WEB also acts as an anti-bullying program for your school by providing it with a cadre of student leaders who look for bullying behavior and help stop it. WEB gives older students permission to be aware of and report any negative behavior they see, creating a safer school for everybody.

WEB is a yearlong transition program with four components that contribute to its success:

Middle School Orientation - WEB Leaders and 6th/7th graders start building the mentor relationship and receive information about how to be successful in middle school

Academic Follow Ups - WEB Leaders support 6th/7th grade academic success and character development through classroom visits

Social Follow Ups - WEB Leaders and 6th/7th graders connect outside the classroom at social events to increase student engagement and promote positive school climate

Leader Initiated Contacts - WEB Leaders connect with their 6th graders on a more individual basis

Middle School Transition Program Increases Student Achievement

The goal of WEB, Boomerang Project's middle school orientation and transition program, is to provide schools with a structure in which students make real connections with each other thus increasing school safety and reducing incidence of bullying. Through this program, students learn that people at school care about them and their success. WEB is the middle school transition program that will increase student achievement, enhance character development efforts and create an anti-bullying environment at your school.
