## **NRHEG School District Update**

Our vision as a school community is to be the school district of choice, inspiring excellence in academics, arts, and activities. We strive to do this every day by empowering students with knowledge and skills to succeed.

At the September 18 School Board meeting, the Board approved three work goals for 2017-2018 including:

Goal 1 (Finance): By July 1, 2018, develop, adopt, and annually update a three-year budget projection plan that takes into account: enrollment projections; anticipated state and federal funding increases; and assumptions on expenditure increases.

Goal 2 (Facilities): By July 1, 2018, develop District master plan to address the adequacy and capacity of the NRHEG School District facilities for the next 5, 10, and 20 years.

Goal 3 (Communication & Marketing): By July 1, 2018, develop and implement a plan to increase the number of school/community partnerships focused on accomplishing its mission and vision statements

As the Board begins work on achieving the third goal focused on growing the number of school/community partnership, I have invited our new Community Education Director, Macy Whiteside, to share with you *The Significance of Community in Education*.

Education is more than reading, writing, and arithmetic. It is one of the most important investments a country can make in its people and its future and is critical to reducing poverty and inequality. Education gives people the critical skills and tools they will need to help them better provide for themselves, their children and their community. Research has confirmed that parent, family, and community involvement in education correlates with higher academic performance and school improvement. When schools, parents, families, and communities work together to support learning, students tend to earn higher grades, attend school more regularly, stay in school longer, and enroll in higher level programs according to the National Education Association.

A person's community plays an important part in the education system. The National Community Education Association states that the field of Community Education is about providing the knowledge and skills for people to not only be self-sufficient and independent, but to create and utilize the interdependencies that must also exist in civil society. It is about creating a safe, fun, and participatory learning culture that incorporates principles and practices of respect, mutual aid, inclusiveness, lifelong learning, skill building, self-appreciation, entrepreneurship, and leadership development – the puzzle pieces that make up community life and learning.

Family and community involvement foster partnerships among schools, family and community groups, and individuals. These partnerships result in sharing and maximizing resources and help children and youth develop healthy behaviors and promote healthy families. We need to work as a community to develop our schools for our specific community needs because the answer to real education is strong, authentic community networks and actions. Community Education truly understands and appreciates the fact that constant review, evaluation, and adaptation to the political, economic, societal, technological, environmental, and demographic shifts occurring in our communities, nationally and internationally, is the key to developing well-rounded and adaptable citizens of all ages.
