Accounting students passed (with flying colors) their first simulation that takes place after Chapter 7. The students learned about and worked through five of the nine accounting steps in the Accounting Cycle -

- 3. Journal each transaction
- 4. Post to the general ledger

5. Prepare a trial balance.

No Bully Program Update from Lise Weegman: "Since the last report to the board on No Bully Training, the No Bully Leadership team has completed several initiatives for the school as per the No Bully program, and there are exciting things to come!.

→ Finalized the interruption phrase, to be used to "interrupt" behavior that is no longer appropriate or acceptable in the secondary building (since our implementation of No bully). This behavior may include acts such as pushing, shoving, teasing, or giving someone else a bad time. The interruption phrase is to be used, consistently, by all NRHEG staff any time they hear students confronting other students in any negative way.

The **interruption phrase** has (4) steps to it and says this:

- 1. "Excuse me
- 2. **That sounded** (name the intention hurtful, mean, unkind, etc) **to me**.
- 3. Here at NRHEG we believe every student deserves to be treated with dignity by everyone".
- 4. Watch them leave and then walk away.
 - → Staff volunteered to become Solution Coaches (Per No Bully program, ten coaches maximum are allowed for each building) Solution Coaches are called when there is a student who is being bullied and has retreated in some way, lost interest maybe in classes, communicating, or even going to school. If agreed upon by the person being bullied, the solution coaches call on a team of students who are friends of the person being bullied, and will call on the bully and friends of the bully. In a series of short meetings, together the team comes up with solutions in how to resolve the conflict. The Solution Coaches have been trained and are as follows:
