Conferences

We had our first round of conferences at the secondary building on October 3 and about 120 families were represented. Thank you to all that could make it!

From Mrs. Eder: "The 6th-8th grade students are using behavior logs to track their behavior this year. Every two weeks the students are given a new behavior log which they are to carry with them at all times. They are also supposed to have a parent/guardian signing it every night. Teachers are able to write positive comments as well as concerns that they have about a student's behavior on the log. The concerns are called Steps and the Steps start over every 2 weeks. Students that have had their parents sign their log every night and have had no steps or only a Step 1 are given a reward which has been the option of going outside on Wednesdays during Panther Time every other week. The first collection of the behavior logs, 94 students were able to go outside. The second collection of the logs, 111 students were able to go outside.

If students receive a Step 3 in a class, the classroom teacher will contact the parent/guardian to discuss the behavior. If students receive a Step 4 in a class, they are given detention which is served during

lunch and the parents are contacted by the office. At this time, only 6 students have been given a Step 4 in a class.

From Mr. Otstot: "We have had three students selected for honor bands in the upcoming month. Lillian Bell, Ben Lewer, and Maggie Maloney will all be going to the University of St. Thomas honor band and Ben Lewer will also be going to the Gustavus honor band."

From Mr. Ferber: "The 6th grade attended the Big Island Rendezvous last Thursday. We had decent weather and learned a lot about living in the past! Very worthwhile experience!"

From Mr. Sorum: "The ag department, with the help of Nurse Petsinger, received a \$1000 grant from Waseca County SHIP for the purchase of 2 cold frames for the school garden. This will allow us to start cold weather veggies earlier in the spring."

From Mr. Stoesz: "About 30 seniors have already applied to a college, or have enlisted with a military branch. I expect a good number more of our seniors will be applying during the last week of October, when almost all colleges in Minnesota will hold their annual "Free College Application Week".

From Mrs. Bently: "The drama club attended "Scare School" at Valleyfair on Friday, Oct. 6. The group consisting of 28 students experienced 2 hours of demonstrations and training regarding set decorating, make-up and acting techniques that can be effective. After the classes, students were able to enjoy the evening at Valleyfair.

The first edition of the student newspaper, the Panther Press appeared in the Sept. 28 issue of the NRHEG Star Eagle. It featured writing and photography by some interested volunteers and members of the "Journalistic Writing" class.

The class "Extreme Non-Fiction" covered the topic of labor and labor relations during September and early October. A police officer and human rights volunteer from Albert Lea shared information about the pervasiveness of human trafficking, and about some of the techniques traffickers use to "groom" potential victims. Another speaker shared first-hand experiences about human rights violations which typically occur in middle-eastern countries."

Senior Jamie McShane has made about 20 special thick braids which are useful for holding classroom doors slightly open. Jamie volunteers her time to make the devices, which provide a reliable, convenient means for allowing re-entry to the classroom when needed, but allow the door itself to remain locked for security purposes. These braids are being made for those teachers at both sites who request them; the district provides the needed cord.
