

As principal, I greatly appreciate the efforts that families are making to support the guidelines and protocol established by the District. I know that many of them are not ideal, they are uncomfortable, require additional time and can be frustrating. However, through your efforts and the efforts of our students and staff, we have been able to remain in the Hybrid Model with the hope that we will be able to return to In-Person Learning soon.

At Monday's Board meeting the decision was made to adjust the Hybrid Learning Model so that Wednesdays become a Distance Learning Day for our students. On this day our teachers will likely be connecting with students, while providing support to them and maintaining interaction with their class. All teachers are working hard to make certain that Wednesdays will be a productive, educational day for our students.

Talking About COVID-19 With Your Child Be open and listen

Allow your child to talk freely. Ask them open questions and find out how much they already know.

Be honest

Always answer their questions truthfully. Think about how old your child is and how much they can understand.

Be supportive

Your child may be scared or confused. Give them space to share how they are feeling and let them know you are there for them.

It is OK not to know the answers

It is fine to say "We don't know, but we are working on it; or we don't know, but we think." Use this as an opportunity to learn something new with your child!

Heroes not bullies

Explain that COVID-19 has nothing to do with the way someone looks, where they are from, or what language they speak. Tell your child that we can be compassionate to people who are sick and those who are caring for them. Look for stories of people who are working to stop the outbreak and are caring for sick people.
